

What is a Pocket Park?


- Pocket parks are urban open space on a small scale often created out of vacant lots or otherwise forgotten spaces¹
- Pocket parks provide important public space in areas with highdensity land use and areas deficient in open space²

Proposed Action: Convert Landscaped Areas into Parks

- Staff has identified two highly visible parcels that are not parks but receive park-like usage which could be converted
 - 4th and Q Street
 - Broadway and Fairfield
- These parcels are already managed by the Parks Division & designating them as parks would allow us to run them like parks

4th & Q Street



Approximately 13,000 sq. ft.


Has a sidewalk along 4th Street and a path along the south side of the property

Within ~150 feet of a bus stop

Highly visible to commuters on Highway 101
